

Orchids Gone Native

- 1. Clean area to work I put a large garbage bag down on my kitchen table.
- 2. Epiphytic orchid Certain genera and species work better, such as Phalaenopsis, Oncidium, Vanda, and Neostylis. This is where a more common species is good.

- **3. Orchid mount** It is important to use a clean, sterile mount which has a rough surface for the orchid roots to attach to. Good mounting material includes cork bark, driftwood, clay pots, tree fern, or a rough stone.
- **4. Bowl of water** You will soak your orchid to soften the roots and loosen them from the inside of the pot.
- Sphagnum moss This will be used to help keep the orchid roots moist on the mount.
- **6.** Blunt knife This may be needed to help remove the orchid from its pot.
- 7. Garden scissors These are used to cut away any dead roots from the orchid.
- 8. Shoelaces or cable ties These are used to secure the orchid to the mount.

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
